The Pledge of Allegiance was recited.

Information on Fire Exits was provided.

Supervisor Hoak comments that there will be a public hearing this evening but, before that there are some special recognition awards to be given out. He turns the meeting over to Councilwoman Hochul.

Councilwoman Hochul comments she is on the Board of Trustees for a wonderful organization called Character First in Hamburg and she is joined today by the President, Suzanne McKenny, and what they want to do as part of their efforts to support this initiative in the Hamburg is to recognize Town of Hamburg employees who demonstrated the character trait of the month. For example, for the month of November and December the character trait was generosity. So they sent a memo around Town Hall asking employees to nominate names. They would like to recognize many different departments. She then recognizes the Town of Hamburg Building and Grounds Department, this was as a result of a letter from Herb Klein, Town of Boston stating that he had no one to put up their holiday decorations, asking if the Town of Hamburg could give them a hand. Being good neighbors, Mr. Connolly assisted them and we received a wonderful letter from them thanking us for our help. Next is the Town Clerk's Department who collected clothing and donated it to the Cornerstone Manor which is a division of City Mission. The Adult Day Care Center adopted a family with a handicapped child from the Lake View area for Christmas. They purchased clothing, toys and a gift certificate from Tops, in particular Nancy Crowley from the Day Care Center started this initiative. The Police Department under the leadership of Joe Kleinfelder and Todd Ehret, collected money to help a fellow Police Officer Nick Ugale's family who was sent overseas to Kuwait during the holiday season (this is an ongoing effort). The Court Clerk's Office decided to collect money, instead of exchanging gifts, and donate to a charity which was given to Nick Ugale's family to cover the costs of snow removal. The Split Club nominated all Town of Hamburg employee's who purchased split club tickets or donated money to support school supplies for 20 kids, benefits for Madison McCarthy, Taylor Briggs, Taysha Teed and Heather Catalano, various families in need of assistance and Nick Ugale's family as well. The split club committee will receive a proclamation, and in particular Tracy Haffner, Building Inspection, was the one who initiated the program in September that purchased clothing and school supplies and they continued the efforts through the holidays where she coordinated finding needy families, doing the shopping and delivery. Councilwoman Hochul comments that she is overwhelmed by the generous spirit of the Town of Hamburg employees. She then asks that the Departments recognized come forward for recognition. Suzanne comments that she has their new informational pamphlets, this is a Townwide concern that involves getting all areas of the community to embrace the character throughout our community.

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At 7:00 o'clock p.m. (Prevailing Time) the Town Clerk stated that a Public Hearing had been called for this meeting at the Town Hall, in said Town, in the County of Erie, New York at 7:00 o'clock p.m. (Prevailing Time) to consider the establishment of Engel Drive Sewer District (the "District"), in said Town. The Town Clerk presented affidavits showing that certified copies of the Order Calling said Public Hearing had been published and posted pursuant to the provisions of Article 12 of the Town Law.

The Supervisor stated that the Public Hearing on the establishment of Engel Drive Sewer District in the Town of Hamburg, was now open and asked if there was any interested person who desired to be heard.

Supervisor Hoak turns the meeting over to Town Engineer, Mr. Kapsiak, for an overview of the project.

Mr. Kapsiak comments that there is a handout on this. He then comments that Bob Marris and Carl Calarco are present from R & D Engineering who helped with the map, plan process for the formation of the proposed Engel Drive Sewer Project. He then explains where Engel Drive is located. There are about ten existing homes on Engel Drive that have septic systems and do not have public sewer service. The systems have been failing over the years leading to some neighborhood complaints about odors and discharges to eighteen mile creek, leading to requests from the NYSDEC and the Erie County Health Department for public sewer service to be extended to the area, which goes back to 1991. In talking to various property owners over the years about this the cost of a sewer project was considered as not being affordable to the property owners. They had applied to various grant funding sources but nothing came through. It was a dead issue until early in 2002 when Tim Crawford, a neighborhood resident, contacted him and asked that it be explored again. He explained that there would need to be a petition from over 50% of the homeowners showing that they are willing to go along with it and understand what the cost would be. This petition was submitted in July 2002 asking the Town to look into forming a sewer district. The petition was signed by 8 of the 10 property owners of developed properties along Engle Drive. They also contacted adjacent owners along Lakeview and Old Lakeview who informed them that they would be interested in being included in the project. This has helped to reduce the overall cost per property owner. They hired R & D Engineering to prepare the map, plan and report which does a preliminary design and comes up with a cost estimate, sets how the cost will be apportioned per property owner. This was followed by the Town Board calling a public hearing on December 9th scheduled for tonight, legal notice was published in the local newspaper and a written notice was sent on January 14th to all the property owners included within the proposed district which informed them of the estimated cost, which resulted from the map, plan and report, and informed them of the public hearing being held tonight. He turns it over to Carl Calarco from R & D Engineering for more details.

Carl introduces himself and Bob Marris. He then describes the area of the proposed sewer district where there are a total of 21 lots.

Dick Manfreda from Bullseye Construction, comments that he has the greatest concern and that he originally put the sewer in, from where they are going to tap in. Would like an explanation of where he donated the land for the pump and how are they going to pick up his lots. Carl explains where the pump will be located and comments that they will bring everyone on-line through an eight inch gravity line. They explain in detail how this will be done. Mr. Manfreda comments that they are providing the sewers from the front and it would be cheaper to do it from the back.

Carl then continues giving an overview of the costs involved stating that they would like to see the price come down as they get into the in-depth design. For the financing they figured it using an estimate of the Town obtaining a 20 year bond at a rate of 4.5%. Hopefully the Town will be able to obtain a lower rate bond or possibly a grant. The annual debt service for these 21 properties would be \$20,859 and the most efficient way to pay this was on a per property basis. If you divide this out it equates to a \$993.00 annual debt per property along with the cost of sewage treatment and maintenance at a cost of \$212.00 per property for a total cost per developed property of \$1205.00. Each resident will be required to provide the service from their house to the Town right-of-way with estimates for this work of between \$1,500 to \$2,000. The Town typically charges a tapping fee, to tap into the sewer system, which would be \$50.00 instead of the typical \$400 fee. Councilman Quatroche questions how the cost is assessed, if it depends on size or assessed value. Carl responds that it is just per lot. The Erie County Sewer District typically requires a \$1,500 connection fee per home to tie into their sewer system and the Town has requested and has been granted that this fee is waived for all existing residencies. The undeveloped properties will be required to pay that fee.

Councilwoman Hochul wonders whether they consulted the Master Plan on this. It was her understanding that there were to be no sewer extensions on Lake View Road in the Lake View overlay. She was originally told ten lots and now there are 21 lots.

Mr. Kapsiak explains that this was brought up to Councilman Cavalcoli, who was not able to make this meeting tonight, and he commented that it was in compliance with the Master Plan because it is providing service to the existing homes on Engel drive and will alleviate any problems with their existing septic systems. Councilwoman Hochul comments that she would like to help the people on Engel Drive. Mr. Kapsiak comments that the concern she has will probably be allayed because, just today, the property owner on the northwest corner of Lakeview Road notified them that he does not want to be included in the sewer district. The only ones along Lake View Road that would be included are Mr. Manfreda's lots which are in an approved subdivision already. Councilwoman Hochul questions Drew if the Master Plan calls for an expansion of the sewers there. Drew comments that it does not call for the expansion. Mr. Kapsiak comments that there was an intention that they would be expanded through the Strawberry Fields subdivision but they weren't able to obtain this through gravity because there isn't enough depth in the area. It was intended, so therefore it is being included in this because it is better to have sewer service than to have septic systems that would keep causing environmental problems. Councilwoman Hochul questions why properties along Old Lake View Road are being included. Mr. Kapsiak comments that he met with the property owners that were petitioned and they suggested additional properties be looked at being brought into the district to lessen the cost per property owner. She comments that is a worthy goal, but she is very sensitive to doing anything that isn't in the Master Plan right now. She then comments that sewers are one tool that they have now to control the rate of growth in Lakeview. She feels that if they ignore that here, what will they have to stand on. Mr. Kapsiak comments that any further extensions than what is shown here could not be accomplished by gravity sewers. The grade does not allow for it. Carl also points out that the two additional lots on Old Lakeview Road are existing developed lots, they are not lots to be developed. They are not extending the district to provide for empty lots. Carl points out another technical item. There are only two locations where they can connect the people along Engel Drive. They had to run the sewer line along Old Lakeview Road or along Lakeview Road to get to the existing County Sewer system. Even if they did not bring those people on-line in those areas they would have to run the line there. Councilwoman Hochul comments that she is not prepared to support expansion of sewers on Lake view Road at this time.

Supervisor Hoak comments that no action will be taken for two weeks.

Councilman Quatroche questions where the connection would be along Old Lakeview Road. Carl points out the area on the map.

Supervisor Hoak opens up for public comments at this time.

Drew Alessi, Engel Drive, comments that if Councilwoman Hochul is protesting the additional five homes it would make the project cost prohibitive. Councilwoman Hochul comments that the original proposal was for Engel Drive residents only. She then comments that she is not trying to increase the burden on Engel Drive residents. She needs to get more information. Drew questions what happens with the undeveloped lots. Carl responds that each lot will pay the annual charge developed or undeveloped.

Dick Manfreda comments that he sees the point that Engel Drive needs the sewers, he doesn't. They then discuss ways of tapping into the sewer. Mr. Kapsiak questions is he saying he doesn't want to be included. Mr. Manfreda responds "pretty much".

Jean Larson, 6411 Engel Drive, comments that they went through this many years ago. She first tried for water because their wells were dry. They were helped with that. After that they tried twice for sewers without success. So, when they heard those lots were going to be sold near them many of the neighbors were elated because finally Engel Drive would get sewers. But the sewers that were put in stopped one house before Engel Drive. They are just asking the Town to take a good look at their area. Eighteen Mile creek is environmentally compromised now and will be in the future. Second concern is the value of their homes when they sell.

Beverly Kiniry, 6451 Engel Drive, comments at the present time she has a faulty septic system. She was going to put in a new system this summer, but because of all this she is sitting on hold. She was told that because of where she lives she would be required to tap in if the sewers were brought there. The situation has been very difficult on her and her family. She was hoping that tonight they could come to some kind of conclusion, obviously not. She is sitting on a time bomb. She doesn't understand, being only two houses away from an existing system, why she can't tap in. Mr. Kapsiak responds that they will have to look into that. The County District line ends east of her property and there is no sewer district to extend to. If she puts in a new septic system, out of necessity, would she still have to hook in two years from now or whenever they do this. Mr. Kapsiak responds yes if you have a sewer frontage on your property the Town and State Code requires that you connect into it. Councilwoman Hochul questions if this gets approved, how long will this take. Mr. Kapsiak responds that because of the high cost per property it requires that it go to State Audit and Control for approval which takes four to six months. Then assuming they get approval they are into the Fall for design and construction next Spring. Councilman Quatroche questions if she was told she had to do it this summer. She responds that she has had several estimates because her tank is caving in. She was told that they would help her nurse it along but could probably only give her a year. He comments that they will do everything they can to push this through State Audit and Control. Supervisor Hoak comments they will have to look at the many options and try and get a timely response. She wants to know if she can put in a whole new septic system right now to fix her problem. Mr. Boehm responds that she shouldn't spend the money on a whole new system if they are going to go through with this project, it is State law she would have to hook up. Carl responds that they could talk to the County Health Department who has jurisdiction over this, and try and get a relaxation of the distance between tanks considering the situation. Supervisor Hoak comments that they should discuss this after the meeting.

Councilwoman Hochul comments that they should try and get this approved next meeting. She just needs time to get all the information she needs. Mr. Kapsiak comments that this is a matter that will probably need another public hearing because they are making significant changes to what is being presented. This will involve revising the map, plan and report and putting out an actual notice of public hearing. Mr. Boehm comments that they could call for a public hearing on the 10th and approve it that night.

Drew Alessi questions if their Assessed Value and therefore their taxes go up if they put the sewer district in. Supervisor Hoak responds that Fred Kinsbury, Assessing Department responded no the Assessed Valuation would not go up.

Dick Manfreda now states that he isn't completely against this.

Letters 5, 7, 8, 9 & 19 - Supervisor Hoak questions if anyone is present that wrote a letter. Joe Kilian responds that he wrote a letter. Supervisor Hoak comments that all of these letters concern the rezoning for Tops along Milestrip. All are negative towards that project happening. Councilwoman Hochul and Councilman Cavalcoli have been working diligently with the Planning Board on this and nothing has been decided at this time. There will be a public hearing. The Board does have some concerns on this. Drew Reilly comments that there will be a scoping meeting on February 12th at 6:00 p.m. to scope the environmental impact statement. The Town Board will be present, all the approvals are at the Town Board level now, the SEQR and the rezoning are Town Board decisions. Councilwoman Hochul comments that there was a meeting of the Planning Board last week on this topic and scores of residents came out to express their concerns. It was a very well run meeting because they understood that the objective at this stage is to define what needs to be researched and looked into further through the SEQR process. The residents were very helpful in helping them identify topics, along with the Department Heads, that need thorough scrutiny. Drew comments that a common question for this project is how long is the process. Drew comments that it will be six to nine months because of the magnitude of the project. Mr. Kilian comments that they want the Tops at Brierwood. Supervisor Hoak responds that they have tried many times for that. Councilwoman Hochul comments that Benderson did not own the old Hens & Kelly building. They just recently acquired it, so now they have the entire plaza to market she is optimistic that something will happen there. Mr. Boehm cautions the Board that this is almost like being in litigation and all comments for or against should be held until a decision is made on this. Councilman Quatroche comments that we should do everything we can to put tax incentives on trying to market the Briarwood site. Joe Kilian suggests an Outlet Mall. Councilman Quatroche comments that demographically it is a tough location. Councilwoman Hochul comments that the discussion on Brierwood is totally separate to the Tops rezoning issue.

Faye Dils, President - Scranton McKinley Taxpayers, questions what is being done about the house on Staley Drive that they complained about. Mr. Boehm comments that there is a trial scheduled, against the owner on February 13th at 9:30 a.m. Councilwoman Hochul comments that this is another example of their newer more aggressive stance they are taking against housing code violations. They have designated Mr. Boehm as a prosecutor on behalf of the Town along with Building Inspection to be more aggressive and try and get the convictions.

Letter 11 - Supervisor Hoak comments that this is from Debora Pound commending the Board on the moratorium, she is in favor of this.

Letter 14 - Supervisor Hoak comments that this is concerning restructuring Route 20. Councilman Hochul has been very active in that in dealing with the State and the DOT in trying to expedite those concerns on the fatalities along there. Councilwoman Hochul comments that she has been in contact regularly with the Director of the DOT and he has assured her that they are taking another look at this project, they are looking at it in phases now. They are a couple of years off from the major reconstruction of the road but they are leaving no stone unturned as far as finding an interim device or technique to come up with for making that road safer. They have acknowledged that there is a problem. They are looking for input from the Town and she and Mr. Ellis will be meeting with the regional director in the near future.

Reports From Town Board Members and Department Heads

Councilwoman Kesner wants to publically thank the Town Clerk, Catherine Rybczynski, for making a very young veteran in our Town very happy a couple of weeks ago. She got a call at her home on a Saturday that a June wedding was set for him and his fiancé, but because he was activated to go to the Middle East he had three days to make that happen. It was 3:00 p.m. on Saturday and he needed a Marriage License. She called Cathy at home and she met him at Town Hall and the next day they got married. He is in the Middle East now and is very happy because he knows he wouldn't have been home for the June wedding. She wants to publically thank her. She also wants to congratulate a newlywed Supervisor Hoak and wishes him many years of happiness. Officially February 1st the Domestic Violence Advocacy program will open. The director has been on board as of January 1st trying to get acquainted with the operations of the Courts and Police. She thanks the Chief for all his assistance and the Courts as well. DECA from the High School has taken this on as their National Project to promote our program. They just delivered 40 cell phones that they collected for the victims. She can't believe that the people in the Town of Hamburg are so nice. Some residents commented they didn't know anybody cared. This shows that we are a caring community.

Councilwoman Hochul comments that she went to the wake of her Social Studies teacher Mr. David Hoffner. He was one of the very strong influences in her life to go into public service and go to law school. She spoke for many years to his classes. He came to her as recently as November to volunteer for the Town, despite his illness, he was hoping to be on the Youth Board and get involved in campaigns. He was a very incredible man and she asks for a moment of silence in memory of Mr. David Hoffner.

Councilman Quatroche comments that they have been having public hearings regarding our Local Waterfront Revitalization Plan. This Plan has come about as a result of the Shoreline Revitalization Committee looking to come up with better plans for the waterfront. In doing that they have also applied for grants and this is a project that will hopefully strengthen their position in regards to the grants. They had their first meeting this evening and he wants to thank those who attended, Joe Kilian, Laura Hahn, Laura's mom, Marty Denecke and Gerry Kapsiak who does a tremendous amount of work for this committee. He does a lot of behind the scenes work. There will be another meeting on Feb. 4th at Lake Shore Fire Hall. On behalf of the Town of Hamburg Recreation Department he announces that the opening ceremonies for Snowfest will be held Saturday February 1st and the event will continue on February 2nd. He also wants to congratulate Supervisor Hoak on his marriage.

Councilwoman Hochul comments that the Town of Hamburg is rapidly gaining the reputation of being the guru of skateparks. She had a couple of calls from Orchard Park and also Newfane School District has called. She and Mr. Denecke will be hosting a round table discussion to give the benefit of their expertise and year and a half of looking at this on weighing all the different options concerning equipment, whether it should be staffed, lighting, etc. they are very willing to share with other communities. She thanks Mr. Denecke for all his help on that.

Supervisor Hoak comments that, on the skatepark, Councilwoman Hochul and Mr. Denecke really took the bull by the horns on this project. What ignited this whole thing was the trip to New York City last February for the Association of Towns. There were many displays and presentations. There was so much discussion on the requests and desires of our young people and they opened it up to both Villages and the Town. It was an instant success. He then comments on the Domestic Violence advocate stating that Judy Neiman worked for the City of Buffalo for many years. As much as she is overwhelmed with work, in Hamburg, when she reacts to her reception in the Town, whether it's the Police Department, Courts, Schools, Hilbert College, teachers, the Rotary, the Lions Club, she is welcomed with open arms and she is overwhelmed by this. She lives her profession and we are fortunate to have her. This is a problem throughout the Country and now we have a source to help people in need. He then comments that we have opened up a Drug Court. Judge Gorman has put a lot of time in, attended a lot of seminars and has followed the City of Buffalo where we have an opportunity for a solution. In Drug Court they sign a contract where they can go to counseling or to rehab and that if they are successful after a one year period the charges are dropped. If they are not successful they automatically plead guilty to the original charge.

Mr. Kapsiak comments that after the Engel Drive public hearing he was talking with Mr. Boehm and R & D Engineering and as far as setting another public hearing, with the time needed to revise the cost estimates the time for Bond Counsel to revise the paperwork, they will call for a hearing on February 10th and hold the hearing on February 24th.

Catherine Rybczynski, Town Clerk, commends Councilwoman Kesner and the whole Board on the Domestic Violence Unit, she is very happy to see that it is finally open, it is a great addition to the Town. She comments on the gentleman she did the Marriage License for stating that he and one of her colleagues Dave Shank, Town of Boston, were activated today and she asks that everyone keep all of our reservists in our prayers.

Mr. Connolly, Highway Superintendent, comments that it has been a long, cold winter and as a result the plows have been out quite a bit and there has been a lot of salting. We are way ahead of our salt usage. We purchase the salt on a bid with the State and we used up our bid. So now not only do we lose the good price of the State bid, we are on the open market. He will probably have a challenge keeping up with that. Councilwoman Hochul comments to tell his crews they are doing a great job.
