7:00 p.m. Public Hearing for proposed local law #2, 1997, to amend Town Code for "Tax Exemption for Veterans".

Barbara Allen, Deputy Town Clerk, reads the following notice as published in the Hamburg Sun and the Front Page:

PLEASE TAKE NOTICE that there has been presented to the Board of the Town of Hamburg on February 24, 1997, a proposed local law to be known as proposed Local Law #2, 1997. This local law provides for an amendment to the Town Code as follows:

Tax Exemption for Veterans

Section 24C-1a Alternative Tax Exemption for Veterans

The maximum exemption limits for the Alternative Veterans Exemption to \$18,000, \$12,000 and \$60,000 as set forth in section 458-a2(d)(ii) of the New York State Real Property Tax Law.

THEREFORE, the Town Board of the Town of Hamburg will hold a public hearing on the aforesaid proposed law to consider final adoption thereof, at the Hamburg Town Hall, S-6100 South Park Avenue, Hamburg, New York at 7:00 p.m. local time on March 10, 1997, at which time all persons interested may be heard.

Supervisor Hoak explains that this law will impact the Town of Hamburg financially in the amount of \$40,000 and it will impact the Village \$10,000, and in the Village of Blasdell \$580.00. If you are receiving this exemption you will not have to come in and apply for this it will automatically take place. This is something the Villages will have to take action on also. We did receive correspondence from the Village of Hamburg in support of this.

Bob Hutchison, Town Assessor explains that the exemption will apply to people who are at the maximum \$80,000 cap with the new limits bringing it up to \$120,000. If anyone has questions they can call his office and speak with him.

Martin Moot, Village Trustee, states that it seems to him that the Veterans are going to get so little out of this that their can be nothing but approval for this new law.

Leonard Sawicki asks if this will apply to the School taxes. Mr. Hutchison replies that the Veterans exemption does not apply to School taxes, only to Town County and Village Taxes.

Councilwoman Hochul applauds Supervisor Hoak for taking this action and acting on it so quickly.

Leonard Sawicki asks if their is a copy of this law available that he could look at. Mr. Hutchison responds that he has a copy in his office.

VIII.

WHEREAS, the Highland Acres area of the Town of Hamburg is comprised of 150 homes which are not currently serviced by the public sanitary sewer system, and discharges from failing septic systems in the area have resulted in downstream water quality problems which adversely affect Woodlawn Beach State Park; and

WHEREAS, plans and specifications for a public sewer system to service this area were previously prepared for the Town by Malcolm Pirnie, Inc. In 1980. However, the project has not yet been able to proceed to construction, due to the unavailability of grant assistance and high cost to local property owners; and

WHEREAS, the New York State Dept. Of Environmental Conservation and the State Office of Parks, Recreation and Historic Preservation have informed the Town that it is expected that grant funding will soon be provided for the construction of the Highland Acres sewers under the 1996 Clean Water/Clean Air Bond Act, due to the need to improve the water quality at Woodlawn Beach; and

WHEREAS, prior to undertaking the sewer construction, it is necessary that a Town sewer district be created, in accordance with the requirements of the State Office of Audit and Control, and this process typically takes 4 to 6 months,

THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED, that Malcolm Pirnie, Inc. Is awarded a contract for providing engineering services to the Town of Hamburg for the preparation of a map, plan and report, environmental assessment, construction cost estimates, and other items associated with the sewer district formation, at a lump sum fee of \$7,600, and that the Supervisor is authorized to sign their February 21, 1997 proposal letter/agreement in this regard.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that these services are expected to be funded through the Bond Act grant, and that Malcolm Pirnie has agreed to withhold their billings until the receipt of such funding by the Town. In the event that Bond Act funding should not be received by the Town for this project, funds are to instead be appropriated through property tax assessments to property owners within the Highland Acres Sewer District, following its creation.

Correspondence

Letter #33 - Supervisor Hoak recognizes Jim Spute for his excellent work in the Finance Department, we are the only Town to receive this award for 14 consecutive years.

Letter #36 - Supervisor Hoak states that the Board is planning to meet with the United Council of Taxpayers at 10:00 a.m. on April 19th for their annual meeting to discuss areas of concern within the Town.

Letter #29 & 30 - Councilman Cavalcoli states that the Town of Hamburg is extremely proud of our Historical Heritage. The Hamburg Historical Society was the recipient of the Dunn House located on Route 62, Gowanda State Rd., near Braymillers. The house is in excellent condition and the Town has been assisting the Historical Society with some minor renovations, and it will serve as the site for art shows, small meetings, tours and displays of historic interest.

Reports from Board Members

Councilman Cavalcoli reports that everything is still on schedule concerning the Master Plan.

Councilwoman Kesner reports she sent out a memo concerning the needs of departments to better serve the public. She has also been meeting weekly concerning the ice rink, looking at a number of creative measures to address some of the problems and looking at the bigger picture of what can be done at that site.

Councilwoman Hochul reports that the code revision committee has been meeting every week and within the next couple weeks they will be scheduling Public Hearings on their recommendations and will be seeking input from that time.

Councilman Quatroche reports that he has been involved in a marketing effort with Erie Community College and has realized the value of the Internet. He has been in talks with C.I.D. Internet and they are looking into doing a home page for the Town of Hamburg free of charge. He has also been looking at the ice rink and what they can do to generate more revenues.

Supervisor Hoak recognizes Timothy Willard, employee of the month, from Community Development who has really served us well dealing with the rehab of homes and senior citizens throughout the Town. He is very open and honest and we are fortunate to have such an employee in our Town.

Business from the Floor

Leonard Sawicki comments that on Winslow by the playground they dug a trench that goes down to Mundy, the water is up to the road, Johnson Street also has a problem with water. On Fairview Parkway they put in manholes by the Town. Supervisor Hoak responds that they will have the Highway Department look into this.

Joyce Van Note states they have a traffic problem on South Park making a right hand turn onto Quimby. They talked to Officer Zawierucha at their watch meeting and he said there was not enough manpower to put a Policeman there to monitor this.

Supervisor Hoak responds that he will talk to the Chief about this.

Councilman Quatroche says that the Chief has responded very well to such requests in the past.

Mr. Ellis responds that the Town has requested a "No Turn on Red" sign and was denied, it is a State intersection. He does know that that intersection has been scheduled for some improvements, he isn't sure, however, what they are.

Councilwoman Hochul states that the Town can have increased surveillance there.

George Komenda, Sagamore Osborne Heights Taxpayers Assoc., comments that they got State mandated repairs in his area, he asks if there is any funding available for this. Gerry Kapsiak responds that they do plan to apply under the Clean Water Clean Air Bond Act for that under the same schedule as the Highland Acres. They are funding the project under the State revolving Loan Fund which gives the Town a 50% interest subsidy on long term Bonds.

Gary Jabczynski wants a follow up on questions from the last Board meeting. He asked if he could purchase diskettes for the Code Books. They respond the Town Clerk is looking into this. He also asked about Planning Board attendance guidelines.

Councilman Cavalcoli responds that this will be written in the Town Policy Handbook and should be ready in June. He will see that he gets a copy. Gary asks if this will go to Public Hearing. Mr. Boehm responds that Town Board or Planning Board policy does not have to.

Michael Mosey, Old Lakeshore Road, states that last month he asked a question about the computer expense for the Building Inspection Department. He says he got another quote from a computer supplier and the difference was amazing. He only saw one bid and wondered why this was not put out for competitive bid.

Supervisor Hoak explains that at first glance it might look that way, but all Departments get more than one bid for equipment. They have learned, from past experience, that companies can offer a low price but then hidden costs come up.

Michael Mosey questions why they had to wait for a major breakdown in the ice rink to address the problems. Why was this not addressed sooner.

Supervisor Hoak responds that they have budgeted dollars for major renovation. They have had committees and volunteers for the past two years working on this. They knew last summer that the most they would get is one more year.

Councilman Quatroche responds that Mr. Gilmartin felt that the rink would go through the season, why spend the money before you have to. He was estimating based on experience. Previous to this they have been putting money away.

Councilman Cavalcoli comments that they were told by Mr. Gilmartin, His staff and the Refrigeration Company that the rink should make it through another season if the weather holds. Then they met with the Hockey Association in the fall and they all agreed that they should try to get through the season because if they shut down now to do major repairs they would lose the whole season. That was the basis they operated on.

Councilwoman Kesner states that they are looking at a plan that can give the Town a lifetime of about 40 years, they are looking at the bigger picture. They are looking at some opportunities to make this a year round operating Recreation Facility, which will generate additional money.

Mike Mosey volunteers for the committee that is involved in making these decisions. He questions how much money has been put aside for this.

Supervisor Hoak states about \$250,000, which won't be enough, but the demand is so great for this there are not enough rinks.

Councilman Quatroche explains that private rinks can charge high fees to Hockey Associations. What they don't want to see, in the Town, is that the sport becomes exclusionary because of peoples income. They want to have a Town facility with open access for everyone in the Town.

Karl Kofod, comments that at the last meeting they discussed spending \$100,000 on computer equipment over the next few years. They should consider the benefit of competitive bidding.

James Spute states that New York State says that if you put out four separate bids of \$10,000 they would consider it one bid of \$40,000 and therefore it must be put out to competitive bid.

Supervisor Hoak explains that the reason why Building Inspection was bid separately, is because they are entering their busy season and the need was immediate, they are not looking into other Departments to purchase separate computers. They want to put the other purchase together as a package.

Jim Spute said that Building Inspection came to the computer committee with an emergency situation. Their system was down and it was taking an abnormal time to process permits, etc. This was put together as a single item because they needed to get it done during their slow season, come spring they would have had a problem. There were two separate bids on this.

Councilman Cavalcoli responds that it sounds like one of the underlying questions that is being asked is were is the Town going with this. Will it be one big project or piecemeal. There is not a single answer, the Board will be receiving some information and presentations from two or three different firms that do facilities management and computerization.

John Wiencik questions why they don't adopt a policy that any bid under \$10,000 but over \$1,000 be put out to competitive or at least get more than one bid.

Supervisor Hoak explains that that is what they do now.

Joyce Van Note questions what they can tell her about the use of Rural Metro in Hamburg.

Councilman Cavalcoli says that they had a meeting on Saturday and he turns it over to the Supervisor who ran the meeting.

Supervisor Hoak explains that approximately two months ago an anonymous letter was written to his office about EMS services within the Town. Simultaneously the State called and said there was a concern about late response time and Rural Metro is available. They then discussed a Fly Car which is an ambulatory service where EMS can come privatized to a home to provide emergency managed care. The Town contracts out to the Volunteer Fire Companies. When he saw that there was a problem, with the assistance of Mr. Boehm, he wrote a letter to the Fire Chiefs, to come meet at Town Hall, approximately six weeks ago. They said yes there are some concerns and there is a problem. He asked them to come back with some ideas, and last Saturday they met again. There are nine fire companies within the Town of Hamburg, two companies are opting to contract out to Rural Metro, the other seven companies came with a proposal that they will contract out to Rural Metro if they can not respond within a decent amount of time (which is around 6-8 minutes). So, the fire companies will be working with Rural Metro, working with Dispatch, to utilize Fly Cars and privatization as needed when manpower can not be provided.

Councilman Cavalcoli adds that Rural Metro is just one agency, of many that provide the same services, which is Commercial Emergency Care Providers. What is to be worked out over the next couple of months is what are the costs going to be and what will the services be. He asks the Supervisor if the costs were brought up.

Supervisor Hoak explains that it is per individual case, sometimes there will be no cost, however there could be a cost, if Rural Metro is utilized, depending on your medical provider. The concern is to provide fast, qualified medical care.

Joyce Van Note states that there are too many regulations being placed on EMT's.

Councilman Quatroche agrees stating that New York State is the one requiring all these regulations. That is one of the reasons volunteership has been so difficult for the fire companies.

Joyce Van Note states that they have a commercial ambulance service at the Lake. What they do is they have an insurance where they charge \$39.00 annually for a family and they transport you anytime you need them and take you anywhere you need to go. This should be something you look into.

Councilman Quatroche states that the Fire Companies do not want the residents to pay for service, they were very vehement about this.

Supervisor Hoak says that the Fire Companies have been discussing this for years. They already had an abundance of information and alternatives that they were looking at. Within six weeks they put this plan together to get quick response time for the residents.

Councilwoman Kesner comments that they addressed a similar situation with Haz Mat and they formed a special squad of volunteers which has been recognized Statewide. They are looking at that same concept for this.
