(Prevailing Time) to consider the increase and improvement of facilities on behalf of Water District Nos. 1 (Lakeview), 3 (Abbott-Highland), 4 (Orchard Park-Hamburg Joint, including Extensions 1 through 12), 5 (Parker Road), 6 (Draudt Subdivision), 7 (Sheldon Road), 8 (Meadow Brook-Greenfield), 9 (Burke), 10 and 11 (Central Hamburg, including Extensions 1 through 3), 12 (Vail Drive), 13 (Bain Parkway), 14 (Beetow Drive), 15 (South Town), 16 (Knab, Lilydale & Benz), 17 (Bonnie Lane), 18 (Old Lake View), 19 (Big Tree/Parker Road), 20 (Wildwood), 21 (Staley Drive), 22 (Picture Lake), 23 (Hamburg North Central, including Hidden Hollow Extension 1), 24 (Osborne-Sagamore), 25 (McKinley District No. 1), 26 (Ockler-Camp Road), 27 (Bayview Road), 28 (Island Acres), 29 (Eighteen Mile Creek), 30 (Big Tree Gardens), 32 (Wanakah), 33 (Beacon Hill), 41 (Thruway), 42 (Deerfield Heights), 43 (Brierwood), Pine Lakes Water District, Ravenwood North Water District, Country Woods Water District and Twilight Subdivision Water District (collectively herein called the "Districts"), consisting of the replacement of various waterlines along portions of Chapman Parkway, Big Tree Road, State Street, Yale Avenue, Pittsburg Street and South Park Avenue, including upsizing of waterlines where required, and other ancillary work in connection therewith; and also replacement of approximately 230 fire hydrants throughout the Districts, at the estimated maximum cost of \$1,961,000, and to hear all persons interested in said subject and for such other action on the part of the Town Board with relation thereto as may be required by law. The Town Clerk presented affidavits showing that certified copies of the notice of said public hearing had been duly published and posted pursuant to the provisions of Article 12 of the Town Law.

The Supervisor stated that the hearing in said matter was now open and asked if there were any interested persons present who desired to be heard. The following persons appeared in favor of such increase and improvement of facilities of said Districts:

The Supervisor inquired as to whether there were any other persons present who wished to be heard. No one appeared, whereupon the Supervisor declared the public hearing closed.

Gerard Kapsiak, Town Engineer, explains that this is a public hearing on water district improvements that are required for the Water Authority to take over the Town water system. A resolution was recently passed to dissolve the water districts. The total cost of these improvements is estimated at \$1,961,000.00 and those funds are currently available in water district funds that have been previously budgeted for water improvement purposes.

Ferd Garcia questions if the figures are going to be voted by the districts themselves or as an overall.

Gerard Kapsiak responds that it's the overall districts, it's money from all the districts put together and used for these improvements

Mr. Garcia questions again if this will save the taxpayers money.

Mr. Kapsiak reassures him that it will.

Kapsiak, P.E., Town Engineer, an engineer duly licensed by the State of New York (herein called the “Engineer”), to prepare a map, plan and report for the joint increase and improvement of facilities of the Districts, consisting of the replacement of various waterlines along portions of Chapman Parkway, Big Tree Road, State Street, Yale Avenue, Pittsburg Street and South Park Avenue, including upsizing of waterlines where required, and other ancillary work in connection therewith; and also replacement of approximately

230 fire hydrants throughout the Districts, at the aggregate estimated cost of \$1,961,000, which map and plan have been filed with the Town Board; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board adopted an Order describing in general terms the proposed increase and improvement of such facilities, specifying the estimated cost thereof, and stating that the Town Board would meet to hear all persons interested in said increase and improvement of facilities on October 27, 2008 at 7:00 o'clock P.M. (Prevailing Time) at the Town Hall, 6100 South Park Avenue, Hamburg, New York, in the Town; and

WHEREAS, a notice of such public hearing was duly published and posted pursuant to the provisions of Article 12 of the Town Law; and

WHEREAS, such public hearing was duly held by the Town Board on this 27th day of October, 2008 at 7:00 o'clock P.M. (Prevailing Time) at the Town Hall, 6100 South Park Avenue, Hamburg, New York, with considerable discussion on the matter having been had and all persons desiring to be heard having been heard, including those in favor of and those in opposition to said increase and improvement of the facilities; and

WHEREAS, the Town Board, as lead agency, has given due consideration to the impact that the project described herein may have on the environment and has determined that such project is a Type II Action and will not result in any significant adverse environmental impacts, pursuant to the State Environmental Quality Review Act (SEQRA), constituting Article 8 of the Environmental Conservation Law, and 6 N.Y.C.R.R., Regulations Part 617.5;

Now therefore, it is hereby

DETERMINED, that it is in the public interest to increase and improve the facilities of the Districts as hereinabove described, at the estimated maximum cost of not to exceed \$1,961,000; and it is hereby

ORDERED, that the facilities of the Districts shall be so increased and improved and that the Engineer heretofore retained by the Town Board shall prepare plans and specifications and make a careful estimate of the expense of said increase and improvement of such facilities and, with the assistance of the Town Attorney, shall prepare a proposed contract for such increase and improvement of facilities of the District, which plans and specifications, estimate, and proposed contract shall be presented to the Town Board as soon as practicable; and it is hereby

FURTHER ORDERED, that the expense of said increase and improvement of facilities shall be paid by the expenditure of District funds currently available for such purposes, which funds have been or will be assessed, levied, and collected from the several lots and parcels of land within the Districts which the Town Board shall deem especially benefited by said facilities, so much upon and from each as shall be in just proportion to the amount of benefit which the improvement shall confer upon the same; and it is hereby

FURTHER ORDERED, that the Town Clerk record a certified copy of this Resolution and Order After Public Hearing in the office of the Clerk of Erie County within ten (10) days after adoption thereof.

Reports of the Town Board:

Councilwoman Kesner reports that October is Domestic Violence month. Throughout the county communities are coming together to work for the safety of the families. This past Saturday the advisory group from the Hamburg Domestic Violence Board sponsored a fundraiser. This was very well attended and publicly thanks that committee and all those who supported that worthy event. The money raised goes to help the victims here in Hamburg.

Supervisor Walters congratulates and recognizes Kurt Allen who was co recipient with the Village Trustee, Laura Hackathorn of the Friend of the Business Award from the Hamburg Chamber of Commerce. Chief Carmen Kenser was awarded the Presidents' Award at the same function this past Friday. Secondly, this afternoon there was a ribbon cutting ceremony at Main & Buffalo with the Mayor along with the Town Clerk, Cathy Rybczynski, representing the Town. He commends the Village and the State for that project. Thirdly, Red Ribbon Day is Wednesday at 5:30p.m. in front of Town Hall. This offers the opportunity to show your support for anti drug involvement. Lastly, the Town of Hamburg was recently awarded from the Department of Defense an award for support of our military, the guard and reserves. The award will be on display in the lobby for all to see. Also, this afternoon the Town Clerk, Cathy Rybczynski, Supervisor Walters, Assistant Chief of Police, Mike Williams and Captain Dan Shea and Detective Angelo Butera, and Mayor Moses attended a remembrance ceremony for Hilbert College student, Meaghan Sorbera. On behalf of Meaghan, the Supervisor asks for a moment of silence.

Reports from Departments:

James Connolly, Highway Superintendent, takes the opportunity to address the Board and the public on budget matters. He thinks it's important that they deliberate further on some of the issues that he is concerned with in the Highway Dept. He did request to be on the agenda at the work session last Monday but was unable to get on. The current budget of the Supervisor does not provide adequate funding for short or long term operations of the Highway Dept. Equipment and materials have increased substantially. The most concerning areas to him are: asphalt, equipment and salt. Asphalt alone has increased 100% and the projected funding he has right now is \$400,000. In 1998 funding in that same account was \$500,000. Equipment has gone up approximately 50% and salt has gone up 30% in the past twelve months. Inadequate funding will result in a serious reduction of service levels. The Highway Dept. over the past few years

has reduced gasoline usage by 26% and diesel was reduced 22%. Over the past ten years the staff was reduced by four full time employees. Keep in mind that every time there is a new subdivision there are also more streets that need to be maintained. He will be happy to work with the Board as he has in the past to continue to serve the people properly.

Supervisor Walters responds that Mr. Connolly talks about the historic increases in costs of material and supplies, he has been presented with a budget that's at a historic increase for his department. He has averaged about \$128,000 increase per year over the last twelve years. Mr. Connolly requested from the Town Board a 1.5 million dollar increase in his budget which would have meant to everyone at 10% increase in your tax rate. He does not find that to be acceptable.

Mr. Connolly responds that he agrees with much of what the Supervisor said but wants to clarify the issue that he is not asking for this to be more of a tax service. This first place to go when you a budget is to see where there are alternative sources of revenues. This Town received over the past two years \$2 million that they never expected to receive from the video lottery system.

Supervisor Walter responds that it is a general fund revenue by law it can only be appropriated in the general fund. It cannot be appropriated in your fund because you're a part town fund.

Mr. Connolly asks for a clarification on that for the public. The money received can only be allocated directly to the general fund. The highway fund is separate from this. Some of the funds he receives is from the State. The increases he has received are just about keeping him even if there weren't increases in the items covered previously.

Steve Strnad notes it's a very good report so the taxpayer knows what they're facing. He encourages the Board to take a look at all departments.

Jim Voyer commends Mr. Connolly in this report. He's a little surprised with the Supervisor throwing out that tax increase based on what Mr. Connolly would like. If that's the only thing from having a tax increase then he's suggesting we sacrifice maintenance of our roads.

Supervisor Walters responds he's suggesting we prioritize. Prioritize projects as to what our needs are versus what our wants are.

Councilman Smardz adds that Mr. Connolly mentioned for the past ten years he was barely making the budget and he questions why Mr. Connolly waited for this year without addressing the issue.

Mr. Connolly responds that he didn't wait, he's done this for the past few years. The big thing is this year is absolutely out of sight with the three main issues, fuel etc. The past few times he went by a thread.

George Lee notes they are getting ready for the winter in the Village of Blasdell.

Catherine Rybczynski, Town Clerk reads a letter that was received by a resident as follows:

To Hamburg Town Board:

Recently I had been awarded a 40% disability which is permanent from the Veteran Administration. I was hoping to get my taxes reduced only to find out that the Town of Hamburg does not recognize what the government has passed. I was informed that the Town Board has to vote on whether or not to accept and add the "Cold War Veteran" to the tax rolls for a reduction. Without veterans from either war time or peacetime we are still veterans who served our country. I believe it's time our Town Board takes care of us.

I hope to make it to the October 27th meeting, but if I can't I would like this letter read and hope that a yes vote to adopt this law for all veterans in my predicament will happen.
